About Us

Founded in 2011, the Patchwork Foundation is a UK-based charity committed to strengthening democracy and supporting the development of young people. We are focused on communities and individuals that are traditionally underrepresented, and seek to engage young people from these communities.

The Patchwork Foundation works to equip young people with the necessary skills and experience to encourage and promote their active participation in democracy and wider civil society. We believe that our society is only as good as our democracy, and our democracy is only as great as the range of the voices within it. We know that increased confidence and self-belief leads to greater participation and realisation. The result is a stronger and more representative country; a nation where we encourage everyone to play their part, and a society that hears and responds to the needs of all.



Our Mission

Our mission is to promote and encourage the positive integration of disadvantaged and minority communities into British democracy and civil society. We are not affiliated with any political party and do not promote a particular political view.

We do, however, work on the promotion of mainstream political and social participation and work with the main political parties and democratic institutions to support this agenda.

Masterclass Programme



The Masterclass Programme seeks to educate and train young adults from disadvantaged and minority communities with classes from top political and public figures.

The Patchwork Masterclass programme aims to develop personal and professional skills, increase political knowledge and experience over a ten-month programme. The programme enables participants to improve their long-term prospects, self-belief, and confidence as active members of political and civil society.



Two cohorts, totalling 66 young people, had the opportunity to learn directly from a range of tutors. Each session focused on a different theme covering leadership, media, policy, campaigning as well as developing a greater understanding into the working of the civil service and the role of Secretaries of State.

Alongside the formal component of each session, there is a focus on personal development with the aim to enhance soft skills, build confidence and resilience.



Induction was held at Parliament, and for **53 out of the 66 participants (80%)** this was the first time they had ever visited Parliament.

At the MP of the Year Awards 2018, 56 Patchworkers successfully graduated from the Masterclass Programme, and joined the Alumni Network.

Applications for the 2019 Programme opened in the Autumn with 196 applications received. Interviews shall take place in early 2019.



Programme Impact

#GetInvolved



The #GetInvolved Programme enables under-represented communities to engage with mainstream politics, by giving young people the chance to take part in campaigns shaping the future.



The #GetInvolved strand includes hands-on experiences of phone banking, canvassing and campaigning to the attending the party conference. These experiences build a safe environment for participants to learn more about grassroots politics, as well as explore their own political views.

To coincide with Local Council elections, the GetInvolved team arranged a number of opportunities for Patchworkers to develop greater understanding about the internal workings of elections.

To mark **National Democracy Week**, a **#GetInvolved: Selection 101** event was held in July in Parliament to showcase the experiences of new Councillors representing Labour, Liberal Democrats and Conservatives. Dawn Butler MP, and local Councillors for three of the parties spoke about engaging in local democracy. **94 people registered to attend.** Positive feedback was received from attendees, with one young person since being selected as a candidate for their local Council.





Applications for Party Conference opened in June, with **114 applications received**. Following interviews, 40 young people had the opportunity to experience the Conservative, Labour and Liberal Democrat Autumn Conferences for the very first time.

Delegates were given a tour of the Conference, encouraged to attend fringe events, special Masterclasses and be present for the leader's speech.





MP of the Year Awards




The MP of the Year Awards celebrate the work of MPs from across the country who actively work with underrepresented and disadvantaged communities across the UK.




Each year a large number of MPs deliver excellent representation and coverage to otherwise underrepresented segments of society. The Patchwork Foundation recognises and rewards those MPs.

The awards provide a motivation for MPs to work with diverse communities and highlights best practice.



A total of 111 different MPs were nominated for the awards. The graph above shows the like for like comparison with nominations since the Awards began in 2013.




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The Judging panel used the anonymised research on each MP to determine the judges choice winners, whereas the **People's Choice** category resulted in **3,423 votes** from members of the public, a significant increase from 2017 where 2,383 votes were received.

18.3% of the votes cast were from those under the age of 30.

The chart on the right shows the breakdown of ages of those who voted, demonstrating that there is greater appeal for the MP of the Year Awards amongst an elder demographic, helping us reach a broader audience.



The Awards were held in December at Speaker's House with over 100 guests in attendance, and also marked the graduation of this year's Masterclass Patchworkers.



The Alumni Network provides a space for Patchworkers to sustain their relationships, and exchange opportunities and advice regarding their personal and professional development.


Being able to maintain relationships with like-minded individuals who share the same stories and core values as you is not only essential in building and expanding your network but also creates meaningful friendships.



The Patchwork Alumni Network is an essential component which focuses on ongoing development for Patchworkers. Its aim is to continue to develop and aid Patchworkers in terms of personal development, leadership and wellbeing through a variety of opportunities and events. Not only does it provide a safe space to explore challenges and solutions, but it also allows Patchworkers to exchange ideas and seek support.

The main form of communication is through the monthly newsletter, highlighting job and voluntary opportunities, as well as highlighting a Patchworker each edition.

The graph depicts the **strong level of engagement** with the newsletter in comparison to the industry average, with the range of opportunities offer being particularly appealing.



“ The IVLP programme has been a truly life changing experience for me. I travelled to the US for the first time in my life and I will most definitely be returning one day. I learnt so much about the US and was particularly inspired by the all the amazing work being done by grassroots organisations and governmental bodies to help empower young people and those from under-served groups to make an active change in their communities. It was great to be able to share our own thoughts and ideas on civic engagement.

I was struck by how ordinary people saw a problem in their community and rather than simply complaining about it - they actively chose to do something. Whether this was in Washington DC, in Busboys and Poets, the cultural hubs founded by Iraqi-American Andy Shallal or whether this was in San Diego, in the restorative social enterprise, Kitchens for Good, breaking the cycle of poverty through culinary training for the unemployed.

Visiting Iowa was a particular highlight for me as we had the chance to see a baseball game and enjoy the famous Iowa corn! I have been particularly inspired to make an active positive change within my community and this has led me to take up a role in a national women's organisation!

IVLP

In the Summer of 2018, the Patchwork Foundation was fortunate to have the opportunity to partner with the US Embassy in London for the pilot Patchwork International Visitors Leadership Program (IVLP), sending seven alumni Patchworkers to the US for three weeks. The IVLP is the U.S. Department of State's flagship professional exchange programme.


Exchanges typically include a visit to Washington, D.C. and three additional cities that together highlight the regional diversity of the United States.

The IVLP programme fits in extremely well with Patchwork's aim to support the development of young people, provide them with unique opportunities, and expand the horizons of participants for them to recognise the important role they play in British Civil Society.



During the programme the group visited Washington DC, Iowa, California and New Hampshire. They met community groups, lobbyists, campaign groups, political parties, political offices and were also welcomed into the homes of local Americans, to develop a better understanding of all levels of US society.

Patchworkers had the opportunity to not only learn about US democracy and meet their American counterparts, but also to hone their interpersonal and professional skills. Their self evaluations demonstrate a shift in perception about the United States, as depicted below.



There was also significant increase in their confidence for public speaking, diplomacy, team working and organisational skills.



Impact of the IVLP

All measured factors show personal and professional improvements, as well as a positive change in perception towards the USA. The programme is important not only for the US, to engage young future leaders from Patchwork but is also important for Patchworkers to be exposed to wider unique opportunities in order to reach and realise their own potential while developing their soft skills.

Since returning the group are working on networking and skill development sessions for other young people not fortunate enough to go on the programme as well as leading on affecting social change in the UK.



A group of Patchworkers were invited to Hogan Lovell's Global Women's Executive Summit in November, to deliver a panel session on bringing your whole selves to the work place. This was well received by all attendees.



Policy Insight with HM Treasury

In September, the Foundation organised a policy day with HM Treasury, providing Patchworkers with the opportunity to gain further insight into the role of the Treasury, and to engage with senior officials before developing their own policy ideas and presenting it in a Dragon's Den type format.
